We are committed to protecting and improving our watershed and helping you do the same.

Looking forward to 2023, CUSP celebrates 25 years working for the Upper South Platte Watershed! Some of our planned projects include:

- Completion of improvements at Happy Meadows to reduce recreation impacts with the installation of vault toilets and parking improvements
- Begin construction to remove the obsolete diversion structure at the mouth of Eleven Mile Canyon (no, not the big dam!)

And we keep our successful programs operating:

- Continuing operation of three slash disposal sites and neighborhood fuels reduction (chipping) program
- Fuels mitigation projects throughout the watershed for both private and public land
- Noxious weed management
- Recreation and trail improvements
- Research into the use of mushrooms to naturally degrade the biomass resulting from mitigation projects



# WATER OUALITY

CUSP, the US Forest Service, Park County, Park County Land and Water Trust Fund (PCLWTF), South Platte Enhancement Board (SPEB), and Sportsmen's Paradise are working at Happy Meadows in Park County to address the impact of increased recreational use. The partners will complete restoration work along three miles of County Road 112 to protect riparian habitat while maintaining safe and accessible recreation use. The final phase of the project will reduce sedimentation into the waterway and eliminate the need for parking along the county road.

- 2,415 feet of post and cable fencing
- 750 feet of buck and rail fencing
- 40 feet of T-post installation to block access

CUSP also completed 110 feet of river restoration, sediment control, and riparian seeding through the town of Lake George, with funding from South Park National Heritage Area and property owners.

Aurora Water sponsored hardening projects to reduce erosion from uncontrolled river access on the North Fork of the South Platte.





Continued design and engineering for the removal of the Lake George diversion structure at the mouth of Eleven Mile Canyon. Look for construction in 2023!





# FOREST HEALTH

Forest Health and Wildfire Mitigation work completed in 2022 with grants from Colorado State Forest Service Grants, Colorado Springs Utilities and property owner cost share.

200 Acres of Mitigation completed, including:

- Colorado Outdoor Education Center/ Sanborn Camps in Teller County
- Woodland Park water supply infrastructure
- Catamount Ranch Open Space in Teller County
- Green Mountain Falls in El Paso County
- Teller County eight subdivisions and six individual properties
- Manitou Springs infrastructure in El Paso County
- 900 trees planted in the Waldo Canyon burn scar by El Paso Bar Assn

Slash Disposal Sites and Neighborhood Fuels Reduction


CUSP provided chipping for 162 properties in Park, El Paso, Douglas and Teller Counties 495 acres mitigated



### RECREATION

CUSP continued working with our partners on maintenance -

- South Platte Enhancement Board, Denver Water, Cutthroat Chapter Trout Unlimited supported the reconstruction of over 1,400 linear feet on the Upper Cheesman Canyon Trailhead/Upper Gill Trail
- Aurora Water and Denver Water for 2,500 liner feet of maintenance on the Trumbull Forests to Faucets site
- The team at Colorado Center for Outdoor Education/ Sanborn
   Western Camps supplied eager "volunteer campers" and funding for ongoing trail maintenance
- USFS Watershed Health to install 19 fire rings in 2022 at US Forest
   Service dispersed camping sites in Buffalo Creek Recreation Area
- Planning and design of interpretive signage at supported by Cutthroat Chapter Trout Unlimited, Denver Water, Park County Land and Water Trust Fund, and South Platte Enhancement Board



#### HABITAT

Noxious Weeds are non-native aggressive invaders that can replace native vegetation, reduce agricultural productivity, cause wind and water erosion, and increase wildfire threats.

- 207 acres treated
- Nine focus species
  - Orange Hawkweed, Canada and Musk Thistle, Yellow Toadflax,
     Oxeye Daisy, Hoary Cress, Scentless Camomile
- C List Species: Common Mullien, Field Bindweed

Installed 2 Boot Brush Stations to encourage anglers and operations personnel to clean their footwear as they enter and exit an area to reduce the spread of Noxious Weeds.

Mushroom Study continues to monitor 10 species of wood-rotting mushrooms in vitro and examine the content and character of the carbon compounds left behind after mushrooms break down wood biomass. Completed US Forest Service Wood Innovation Grant.

CUSP crews removed 3,700 feet of fencing to remove wildlife hazards and enhance movement through Colorado Open Lands.









#### VOLUNTEERS

Our volunteers have a huge, positive impact on the watershed. Here's what volunteers accomplished in 2022:

- -1,072 volunteer hours mitigating noxious weeds
- -900 seedling trees were planted with 208 volunteer hours
- -547 volunteer hours on trail maintenance
- -278 volunteer hours on forest fuel mitigation
- -602 volunteer hours on water monitoring at the High Creek Fen
- -94 volunteer hours to install fire rings in Buffalo Creek




